Though many associate Lincoln with his stovepipe hat, it had a practical use. He often stored important papers inside it, turning it into a portable filing cabinet during his travels across the country.



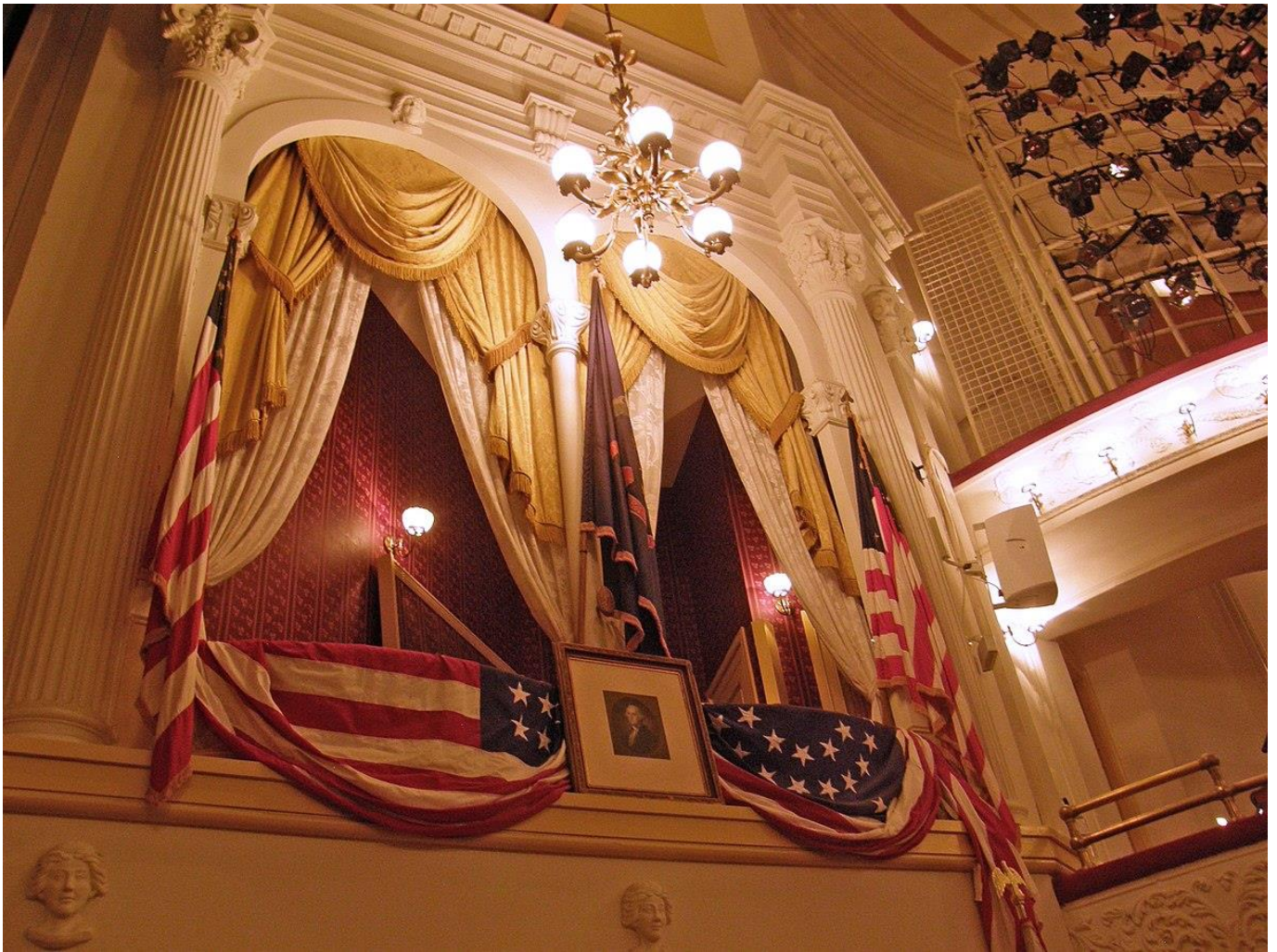
